

How to Find and Get High Pagerank .edu and .gov Backlinks

- In it you will find the exact steps to follow to find and obtain backlinks from high ranking .edu and .gov websites, links that Google places a lot of value in.

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Let's Begin.

✓ What exactly will we be doing?

Utilising one of the most effective yet time consuming link building methods around: Blog commenting.

But not just any blog commenting, today I am going to show you how to get high ranking .edu and .gov backlinks, or at least show you how to find those pages so you can leave a comment .

I've read a lot of guides on how to find these types of links and to be honest, they generally leave me more feeling more baffled than when I arrived. **So this is my guarantee to you.**

“By the time you have finished reading this guide you will not only know how to go and find the blogs to comment on, you will most probably already have opened a new window and started the process already”.



✓ Step 1: Get SEOQuake

You are going to want to install SEOQuake, an add-on for Firefox and Chrome Browsers. You can download and install the plugin [here](http://seoque.com).

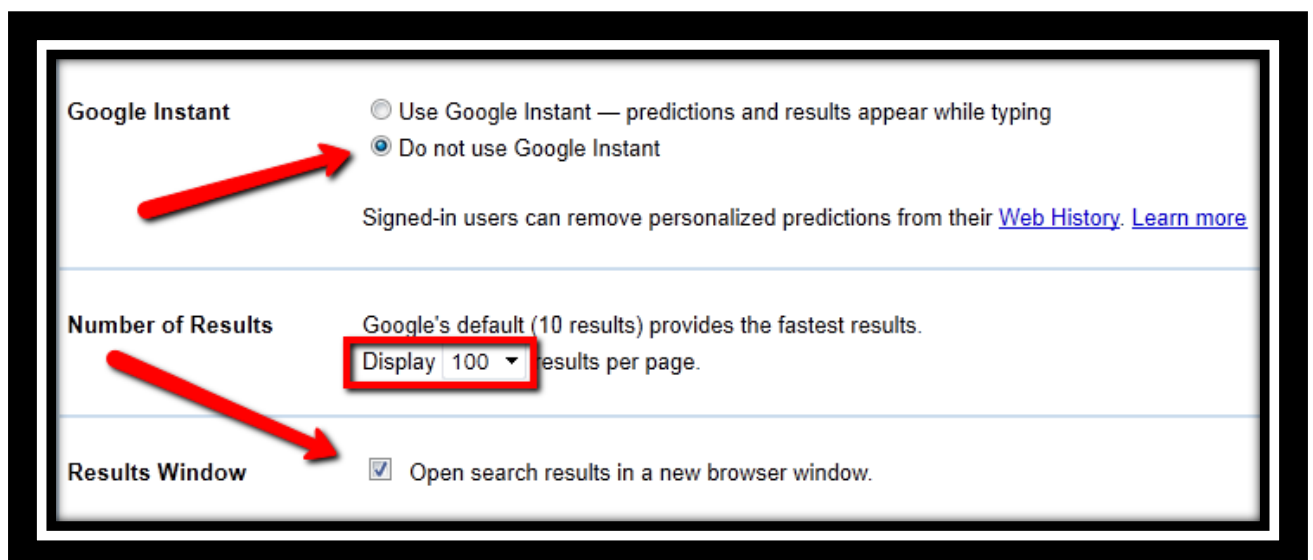
...don't ask questions! Just do it already.

✓ Step 2: Google Preferences.

You should change your preferences in Google so as to remove the stupid pain in the arse very clever 'Instant' feature. Once you have done this you can now change how many results you get per page. I recommend changing it from the default of 10 to something more conducive to the task ahead – say 100 results per page.

I also advise to set the browser to open the results in a new window. (see screenshot below)



✓ Step 3: Here is your Entry Code

OK now that you have everything ready it's time to start searching for blogs to comment on. In order to do that we need to ask Google for sites that end in either .edu or .gov and also contain the word blog in the URL (let's be honest now – 9 times out of 10 the name of the blog is blog – especially when you are talking Government and Educational Institutions) . Of course, we also need to specify a keyword.

site:.edu inurl:blog keyword

and that's it.

Do Follow/No Follow

You can install a number of SEO addons to enable you to see whether a link is do follow or not, but my experience of this method is that you usually average out to around 50% of each. Now I actually recommend ignoring this attribute completely because 1: it adds time to the process meaning you get less done and 2: Google actually likes to see a mix of do and no follow links, so regardless of what you read – they DO follow those links and there is a certain consideration taken.
